WE Students Sponsorship Program Update

In June, the fees of 52 students were successfully disbursed through CRDS. Each term,



students approach either the WE Group President, Mr. Tamilmani, the Secretary, Mr. Ambrose, or other core committee members. Some students are also recommended by diocesan priests.

The committee collects and verifies student details, including name, course, college/university, year of study, family background, bank account

information, photos, and identity cards. This information is submitted to CRDS, which transfers the fees directly to the students' bank accounts via Indian Bank.

Editor's Desk:

The Indian caste system continues to poison every layer of society, leaving Dalits vulnerable to discrimination and injustice, no matter how educated or accomplished they become. Even as Dalit individuals break barriers and rise to higher positions, they are often met with disdain, exclusion, and subtle or sometimes overt hostility from colleagues and members of upper castes. The persistence of such prejudice is both heartbreaking and infuriating. Two recent incidents, in particular, have shaken me to the core, serving as painful reminders that caste-based oppression remains a grim reality in India, resisting the progress that so many Dalits have fought tirelessly to achieve.



On October 7, 2025, Mr Y. Puran Kumar from Chandigarh (IPS), a senior Indian Police Service officer and member of the Scheduled Caste community, tragically committed suicide. In his detailed suicide note, he described years of discrimination, harassment, and public humiliation by colleagues and senior officials, despite his professional achievements and high-ranking position. The case has drawn attention to the institutional challenges faced by Dalit officers within the police hierarchy, raising urgent questions about accountability and grievance

redressal mechanisms.



On October 6, 2025, Justice B.R. Gavai, Chief Justice of India (Supreme Court), a distinguished scholar and Dalit Buddhist narrowly escaped an attempted attack in court when lawyer Rakesh Kishore allegedly tried to hurl a shoe at him in reaction to his remarks on the restoration of a beheaded idol of Lord Vishnu in Khajuraho temple complex, Madhya Pradesh. The temple is protected as a UNESCO World Heritage site. As Public Interest

Litigation filed under Justice Gavai bench of Supreme Court, Justice Gavai directed any inquiries related to UNESCO world heritage site falls under the supervision of Archaeological Survey of India. Upon this direction and comment on Lord Vishnu, Lawyer Rakesh Kishore belonging to high class Brahmin reported that this act is against the attainment of Sanatana Dharma (Eternal Truth) and hurl a shoe at Justice Gavai. Justice Gavai, a true follower of Dr Ambedkarite Buddhism calmly proceeded this act. This brazen assault, rooted in caste-based hostility, exposes the alarming vulnerability of India's judiciary to targeted outrage, the distortion of judicial statements, an act of contempt of court and the viral amplification of controversies via social media. Such incidents starkly reveal the dual pressures confronting the nation's highest courts, the challenge of upholding justice in the face of societal prejudices and the relentless scrutiny of a reactive public sphere.

Together, these incidents reveal that caste-based discrimination and social prejudice remain deeply entrenched in Indian institutions, affecting even highly educated and senior officials. They highlight the urgent need for stronger mechanisms to ensure professional respect, institutional accountability, and protection against caste- and biasbased harassment.

Visit to Europe – September 2025

During my recent visit to Europe in September 2025, I had the honour of attending the



baptism ceremony of my friend Dr. Hannes Datta's son Jonathan, where I was invited to serve as the Godmother. On this special occasion, our friends and well-wishers organized a series of gatherings with our donors, partner schools, and friends across Europe. I was accompanied by my sister Viji, and together we used this opportunity to strengthen our partnerships with Aktion Indien and Arivu in Germany, as well as Mercy Home in Belgium.

Our journey began in Amsterdam, at the home of Dr. Hannes Datta. From there, we stayed with "Pappa" Dr. Johannes Mispagel, who warmly hosted us. On 9th September, we visited Mariano Gymnasium Josephinum, where we were received with great warmth by the Director, staff, and members of the India Club. A special gathering was organized by Mrs. Cordulla and Mr. Mathis, to whom we extend our sincere thanks. In the evening, we also met several school teachers, parents, and friends of Dr. Johannes Mispagel.

Next, we visited Gymnasium Osede, where Mrs. Kathrin Haase coordinated all arrangements. The school's Director, staff, and students extended a heartfelt welcome. We presented our project activities and appreciated their continued support. We then visited Albert-Schweitzer-Schule, spending two days with the ARIVU

team, Mrs. Hilde, and friends. The School Director, along with teachers and students, welcomed us enthusiastically and showed genuine interest in our work.

Another special stop was Gymnasium Buschkids, which we revisited after many years. It was deeply inspiring to witness the strong commitment of the Director, staff, and students to our projects. Although it is a kindergarten-level institution, their involvement remains steadfast. All these schools have active "India Clubs," where students play a key role in fundraising. On their designated Social Day, students work in different places and contribute their earnings to support our initiatives in India.

Our time in Belgium was equally meaningful. We met Mr. Jacque Vellut, founder of Mercy Home, and spent time with his family. We also stayed two days with Mr. Dirk Portier in Wetteren, where we had fruitful discussions about our projects and shared quality time with Ms. Sara Portier.



Later, we spent two days with Mrs. Ann Sheela and her family. She works at Christu Roi College, where we presented our work to nearly 200 students through a PowerPoint presentation. We also met many friends working at the same school and had an evening gathering with former students and teachers.

A particularly moving moment was meeting Mrs. Brigitt and friends, the sponsor parents of the late Rev. Fr. John Suresh. We concluded our trip with a two-day parish visit.

I am deeply grateful to all our dear friends and partners in Europe for their warm welcome, genuine interest, and unwavering support. Each visit enriches us with new learnings and strengthens our resolve to continue our mission with renewed energy. I carry with me the love and encouragement of our extended family in Europe, which continues to inspire and sustain our work.
